Surprised, the students saw 700 people bowed in prayer, seeking a blessing on the service that was soon to begin in the auditorium above. Softly closing the door, the gentleman then introduced himself. It was none other than Charles Spurgeon.

### A Look Back

As we celebrate our 55<sup>th</sup> year of ministry, I wondered about the history of Rainier Christian Schools' logos. Thumbing through musty files, the earliest logo for RCS appeared on a document dated July 1, 2003. After July 2003, the mountain-and-cross design emblazoned all district-level letterhead. Note the two design variations.



How did it start? A big clue jumped out in front me from two pages stapled together. The first page only showed an email dated June 29, 2001. A meeting agenda attached to the first page contained a specific line item. It read: "Project Definition in all operations and communication Graphic – need for school emblem."

From the paper trail, a team developed/designed RCS' first logo during 2002 and early 2003. The mountain and cross logo remained active for 12 years. In 2014, another team coordinated with Global Village Concerns to create a suite of new logos. The newer designs appeared on RCS letterhead and brochures beginning in 2015. Shown on next page.

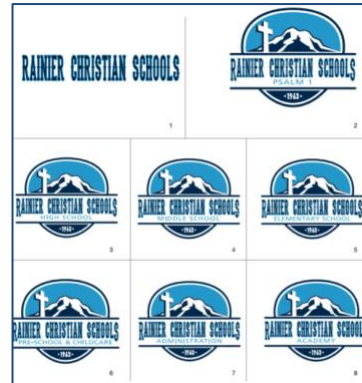
